Learning Community Spotlight

This month the Learning Communities Program is shining a spotlight on a learning community that has gone above and beyond this year— The Sociology for Pre-Meds.

SOCIOLOGY 4 PREMEDS is a Learning Community that is embedded in a section of Sociology 1010, Understanding Human Society. Dr. Janet Hankin, Professor of Sociology, developed the Learning Community class in 2015 in conjunction with Helen Wilson, an advisor in the Pre-Med and Health Sciences Center. Peer mentors for the course are: Niharika Chinta, Randi Foust, and Samantha Tirakian. The course is particularly relevant to pre-med students and it is essential for performing well on the new version of the MCAT exam. The course examines traditional sociological theories and uses examples from the health care sector to illustrate concepts. The students create power point presentations in their peer mentor groups that address the topic: "The Impact of Social Factors in Health and Health Care." The peer mentor groups are analyzing inequalities in gender, race & ethnicity, and poverty and the effects of such inequalities on health and health outcomes.

LC students in the photo (right) were at a presentation on pathways to medical school by Helen Wilson and Deborah Holland (WSU Medical School Admissions). On October 9th, 2019 students heard from a panel of senior pre-med majors and WSU medical students. In addition to the class, LC students are required to attend two lectures, meetings, or programs on a variety of topics. Movie nights are another activity sponsored by the learning community. A panel of physicians will talk to the LC students in November.
