The WSU program in Community Health is unique because it specifically prepares students to take the Certified Health Education Specialist (CHES) exam, given through the National Commission for Health Education Credentialing (https://www.nchec.org). The CHES certification is the only nationally and internationally accredited health education and promotion certification on the market. The CHES credential ensures employers that the potential employee has taken the initiative to pursue additional certification and that they have real-life knowledge, and experience planning, implementing, evaluating, and advocating for health education programs, all skills the WSU program prepares students to do.

Wayne State electives and degree enhancements

Consider electives as additional opportunities for you to gain marketable skills like critical thinking, leadership, and communication. These skills build a strong foundation for long-term career success. Defined broadly, career learning includes, but is not limited to, the following:

- Interdisciplinary project-based learning and fieldwork
- Internships, micro-externships, and co-ops
- Global experiences/education abroad
- Community service learning
- Research in the field and in lab settings
- Alumni and professional mentoring, job shadowing and other developmental experiences
- Entrepreneurship and other business development opportunities

Accelerated Graduate Enrollment (AGRADE)

AGRADE applicants must have a cumulative GPA of 3.30 or better. Applicants are also expected to have performed at a superior level in the major, as determined by the department. The earliest a student may apply for the AGRADE Program is the semester in which he/she completes 90 credits toward the undergraduate degree. Students should consult with their undergraduate advisor in their major department to seek advice about the appropriate time to apply for AGRADE status.

Notes

- Wayne State requires a minimum of 30 credits in residency.
- The pathway allows multiple associate degree options with the flexibility to customize your degree path. The minimum eligibility to participate in the Wayne State Transfer Pathways is a cumulative GPA of 2.5 or above, Michigan Transfer Agreement (MTA), and an associate degree (earned or Reverse Transfer). See transfer credit guidelines.
- All college-level (non-developmental), non-duplicated courses with a 2.0 (C) grade point average (GPA) or above will be considered for transfer credit. Earned credit will transfer as 1) direct course equivalency, 2) major/department credit, or 3) elective credit. Credits not earned at Macomb will need to be taken at WSU.
- These pathways do not replace the importance of Macomb and Wayne State academic advising. The pathway provides a general roadmap to degree completion.
