This transfer plan will help guide you in making the transition from community college to Wayne State University. Here are some things to keep in mind before you begin:

- No more than 64 credits from a two-year school will apply toward a Wayne State University degree, though all courses taken will be listed on the Wayne State University student record. If you are following an articulation agreement, more than 64 credits may transfer.
- We strongly recommend that you see an academic advisor to learn what the path to your degree looks like. You can make an appointment here You are encouraged to see an advisor while you are taking classes at your community college to ensure you are taking the correct courses. If you need help making an appointment, please call the Transfer Student Success Center at 313-577-2487.

One of the main areas of focus for transfer students is **General Education Requirements.** These are classes in addition to courses within your major that are required to ensure fundamental skills and a well-rounded education. There are three ways that transfer students can meet these requirements:

Michigan Transfer Agreement (MTA)

A student whose community college transcript is endorsed as "MTA satisfied" has completed WSU's General Education Requirements. See your community college for specific MTA information and courses that qualify for MTA.

Note: Students must take either a second course in English Composition or one course in Communications beyond the MTA requirements at the community college.

MACRAO Agreement

A student whose community college transcript is endorsed as "MACRAO satisfied," has the "MACRAO stamp," or has earned one of the following associates degrees (Associate of Arts, Associate of Science, Associate of Baccalaureate Studies or Associate of Liberal Arts) has completed WSU's General Education Requirements.

Major Requirements:

- Courses lower than 3000 will not be counted for a major in Foreign Language. Computation of the major includes only those courses taken in college beginning at the 3000 level. The courses must include grammar, literature, culture, and conversation. Courses taught in English about the culture or language will not apply. Students may be required to complete lower level courses as prerequisites to courses at the 3000 level or above.
- Students who major in a language are advised to minor in English or in a second foreign language.
- Completion of Foreign Language courses is not sufficient for teacher certification. Students must score at the Advanced Low Level in French, German, Italian, or Spanish, or at the Intermediate High Level in Chinese, or Russian as measured by the Oral Proficiency Interview (OPI) from the American Council on the Teaching of Foreign Languages and pass the Michigan Test for Teacher Certification in the appropriate subject area.
