### Outside of Prentis Building

**Walking tours** of main campus depart every 15 minutes and are approximately 30 minutes in length. A Warrior Guide will lead you around campus and make three stops: the Mort Harris Recreation and Fitness Center, the David Adamany Undergraduate Library, and one of three residence halls (Atchison, Ghafari or the Towers Suites).

**Bus tours** of Midtown depart every 30 minutes and are approximately 45 minutes in length. A D:hive tour guide will show off our neighborhood retailers, restaurants, museums and lofts. You'll experience Midtown for yourself when you make a stop at The Nest and City Bird.

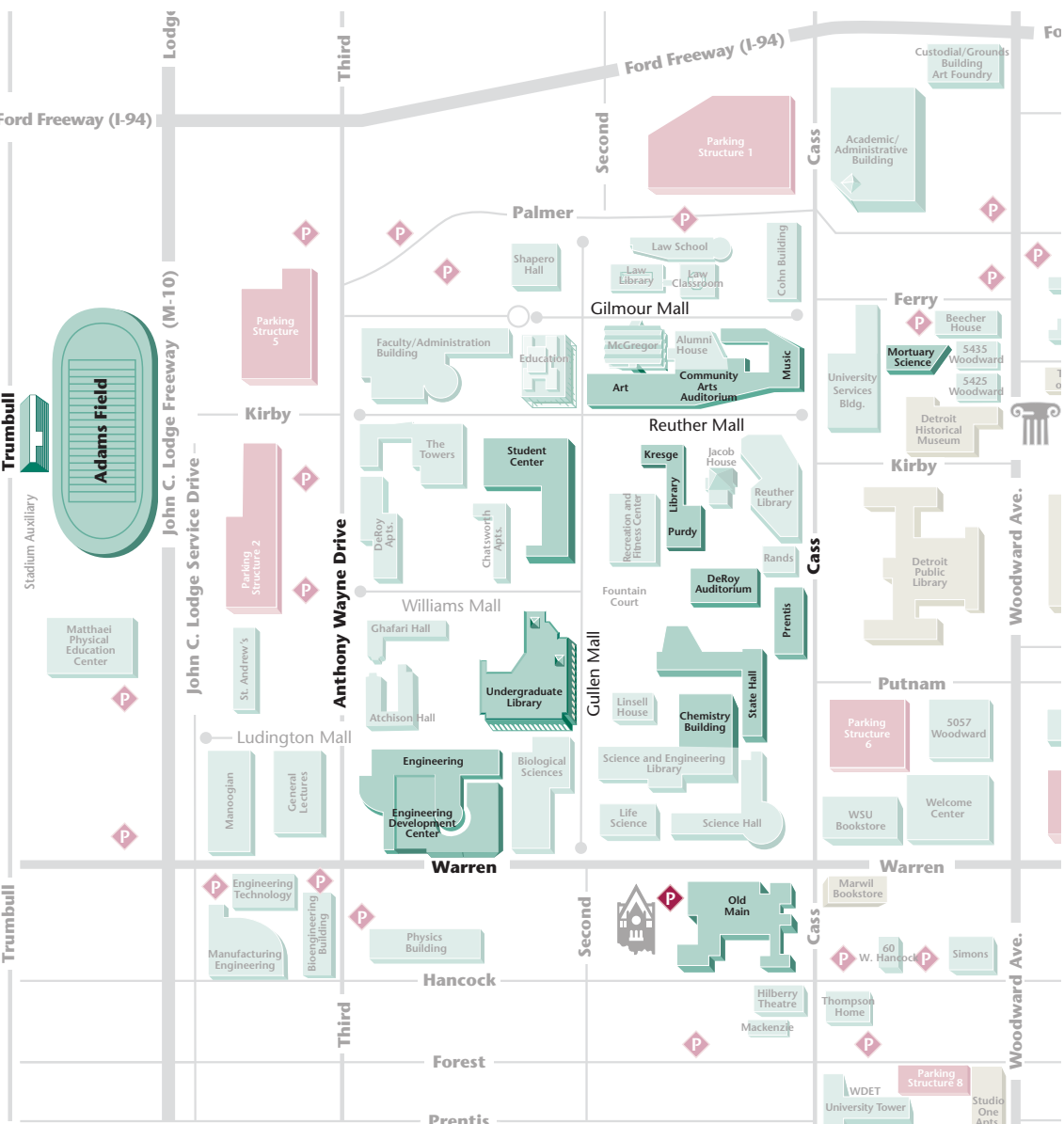

### **LECTURE: THE SEARCH FOR THE HIGGS BOSON, 11 a.m.**

*Purdy/Kresge Library*

The 2013 Nobel Prize in Physics was recently awarded to Peter Higgs and Francois Englert for their work illuminating the origin of mass. Professor Robert Harr will discuss how their theory relates to the origin of mass and predicts the existence of a new particle, the Higgs Boson. Physicists working at laboratories around the world searched for 40 years before finding the Higgs Boson in July 2012. The discovery was reported by two experiments, ATLAS and CMS, both operating at the Large Hadron Collider at the European laboratory CERN in Geneva. The exciting story of this search will be discussed.

- What is the best way to get around the area?

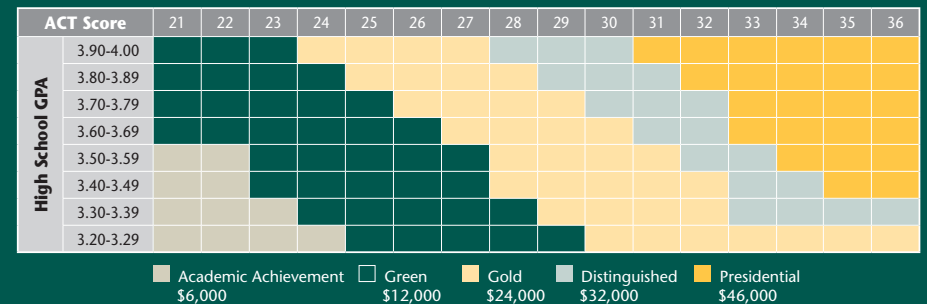

Students who have completed a bachelor's degree are not eligible for these scholarships.
